COMPREHENSION ET EXPRESSION

1. How many characters are present in the scene? Give their names, ages and occupations when possible.

Two characters are present in the scene: **Nora**, who is a **writer**, and **Sally**, who is in her **thirties**. **4 points** (1pt x 4)

Bonifier d'éventuelles hypothèses sur les éléments implicites :

- Nora is probably younger as she baby-sat for Sally. (1 point en bonus)

- Sally may be a school teacher (or university lecturer) as she is given the book at the end of "the school year" (line 11). (1 point en bonus)

2. What is the relationship between them?

Nora used to **baby-sit** for Sally. They are **friends**. (1+1)

Friends = 1 pt

baby-sitter = 1 point

- 3. a) What interest do they have in common? They share an interest in literature/Ireading. 3 points
 - b) Explain in your own words how this interest manifests itself. Give two elements. Sally seems to be interested in reading Nora's fiction. (lines 5-6) Besides, they sometimes exchange views about literature. (lines 6-7: "... to trace the influence of writers they'd talked about...')

 3 points (1.5 Pts x 2)

4. Line 5: "...this was the story Nora decided to let her read."

a) What is the story about?

The story is about a (female) character who remembers a past love affair and who imagines what might have happened if this affair hadn't come to an end. (Accepter: who may not have got over her break-up with her former lover)

4 points (2+2)

b) How did Nora expect her to react to this particular story? Why? Give two elements to justify your answer.

Nora thought Sally would find the story **entertaining** ("amusing" line 6) for two reasons:

- the main character in the story is based on her and her life. (lines 1 and 7)
- the story might remind her of their conversations about literature as it contains references to famous writers they had talked about. (line 7)

5 points (1+2+2)

5. Focus on the passage from fine 11 to 14. Describe Sally's attitude before and after Nora gave her the story. Initially, Sally seemed to be impatient to read Nora's story (line 12 "Sally said she was eager to read it"). (2)

Yet, after reading the story, she didn't seem to be in a hurry to give her impressions about it /SEEMED UPSET(line 12 "but Nora heard nothing from her for two weeks.'), so much so that Nora wondered whether she had actually read it. (line 14 "Nora asked her if she'd had a chance to read it.') (3)

5 points (2+3)

Read from line 15 to 39.

6. Who initiated the meeting and why?

Nora initiated the meeting as she had not heard from Sally for two weeks and wanted to have her impressions about the novel. (fines 12-13)

5 points (1+2+2)

7. a) How does Sally react to the story she has read?

Sally does not seem to be particularly enthusiastic about the story (line 17 "I can't say it filled me with a fond elation'). She even seems to be irritated / hurt (line 18 "not exactly flattering').

5 points (2.5+2.5) (Bonus 1pt: reference to kind of character that "has not really lived.")

b) In your own words, explain her reaction. (40 words)

She resents being used as a model for a fictional character. She also feels Nora has betrayed her trust by snooping around her private belongings and reading through her diaries. But above all, she is angry with Nora for using her findings in her novel.

6 points (2+2+2)

- **8.** Line 28: "You mean there *was* a Jesse?" Comment on the use of italics. What do they tell you about:
 - a) Nora's emotion? it illustrates Nora's surprise. (She can't believe what she's hearing.)

 3 points
 - b) the character of Jesse? It shows that the character of Jesse really existed and that Sally probably had a relationship with a man called Jesse.

 3 points (1.5+1.5)
- 9. Line 31: "Are you saying you <u>came up with</u> the name of Jesse <u>out of the blue?"</u> Explain the underlined section using your own words.
 Are you saying you thought of the name Jesse just by chance?

6 points (3+3)

10.What did Sally decide at the end of the conversation and why? Support your answer with elements from the text. (30 words)

As Sally realised that she could no longer trust her friend (line 37 `l'm not sure if 1 believe you') (1+1)

and probably thought that she would not be able to forgive her, she decided to leave the coffee shop (line 38 "gathered up her things") (1+1)

and put an end to their relationship (line 39 "Nora never heard from her again"). (1+1)

6 points (1pt X 6)

Read from line 40 to the end.

11.Line 40: "The episode left Nora with <u>a confused wash of emotions".</u> Explain the underlined segment in your own words. (40 words)

On the one hand, Nora is sorry about hurting a friend. She is also upset about being wrongly accused of prying into her friend's private business. On the other hand, she feels proud to realize that, as a writer, she has some sort of power over people.

6 points (2+2+2)

12. Nara suddenly realises that she has a gift unknown to her before. Which one? She realises that she is able to uncover secrets about people's lives (line 39 "the power to root out the truth about people's lives').

Accepter: line 32 "Maybe I'm psychic"

13.In your opinion, to what extent could this talent hurt people?

She could hurt people by revealing secrets (line 47 "intuited more about them than they wanted anyone to know') and weaknesses (line 48 "people's psychic frailties") that they may want to hide.

- 14. Choose one of the following subjects: subject 1 OR subject 2. 250 words approximately. Indicate the number of words.
- **Subject 1:** lines 36-37: "Sally finished her coffee and studied Nora as if she was trying to decide about her once and for all..." Starting from this point, imagine a completely different ending to this story.
- **Subject 2:** Do you think writers have the power to affect people's lives? Support your point of view with specific examples.
